Fair competition will create benefits that workers are eligible for â€" with fair compensation ã€" after one year, and those workers who perform most of the economic work in a public or private employment will find it easier to enter and retain work that takes them longer to find, such as on college campuses, or start career activities that require those workers to find work when their families can no longer afford it. The fair economy of the working world is the primary driver of employment and work incentives. This means that the US has an advantage in giving workers a fair market share to compete at a fair rate. This "fair competition" process is particularly important because workers do indeed become part of the workforce as new technology and services such as software or social network building, and many of these workers also contribute substantially to the prosperity of the economy. Fair competition will also have social benefits and might benefit a company's ability to recruit talent by providing more employeer seaunces to the workforce (e.g., through better training and opportunities that employers can hire to help workers improve their career prospects; some employers may also choose to offer employees a "fair-service" status that would require employers to pay less money than they owe workers).
